William Stevenson is president of National Tax Consultants, a full service tax preparation service for individuals and businesses. Bill is an Enrolled Agent, licensed by the United States Treasury to represent taxpayers before the Internal Revenue Service. He is a Certified Financial Planner and has an earned Doctorate in Education from Temple University. The Doctoral program concentrated on Educational Administration. In addition, Bill is one of about 250 professionals since 1943 who has been admitted to practice before the bar of the United States Tax Court as a non-attorney.

Prior to beginning his own practice in the field of taxation, Dr. Stevenson's career was in education. He was a senior administrator in the formation and development of two community colleges: Gloucester County College in southern New Jersey and LaGuardia Community College of the City University of New York. Subsequent to the community college experience, Bill was the Dean of Students at Pratt Institute in New York City and the State University of New York in Farmingdale.

After leaving the field of higher education, Bill called upon entrepreneurial skills in the development of his own tax business. During that time the Commissioner of the Internal Revenue Service appointed him to a two-year term on the Commissioner's Advisory Group. Bill worked closely with the 'Commission to Restructure the IRS', met periodically with IRS and Congressional officials in Washington to recommend changes in procedure as well as to provide the staff with feedback from the practitioner community. Bill has also testified before both Houses of Congress, the IRS Oversight Board and the Government Accountability Office.

In 2002, Dr. Stevenson was named 'Accountant of the Year' by the National Society of Accountants and in 2006 he received the 'Founders Award' from the New York State Society of Enrolled Agents. In 2007 Bill was appointed as 'Ambassador to the IRS' for the National Society of Tax Professionals.

Bill feels one of his greatest accomplishments was in 1998 when he persuaded Congress to include the change of the IRS' mission from enforcement to Service in RRA '98.
